# Taking the Stage



Throughout this term children across the Trust have been learning poems, songs, lines and dance moves, preparing for performances in school and outside. As well as requiring great collaborative work, these performances are often huge personal achievements, enabling the children to grow in confidence and exceed their own expectations.

**Kimbolton's 'Summer Soirée'** featured a huge number of individual and group performances. **Kimbolton's Choir** are also currently in 5<sup>th</sup> place in the WellChild Foundation School Choir of the Year Competition, with the winner to

be announced in September. Year 2 children from our **St Neots schools** enjoyed learning the seven songs needed for the **Music Festival** held at the Priory Centre in July. It was lovely for the children to experience singing in a concert setting, and to perform with other year 2 children from DLPT and other local schools. They performed very well and, as always, were excellent ambassadors for their schools.

Braybrook took part in the Cresset Dance Show, and Middlefield, The Round House and Wintringham have hosted Talent competitions, with an impressive array of confident and talented performers taking to the stage. Middlefield's winner Elliott (right) rocked the stage! Leverington worked together with Murrow to put on a 'Strictly Dance Extravaganza' for the parents and families of both schools, held on the outdoor stage at Murrow at the end of term. Each class worked hard to choreograph and perform a routine of different dance styles which they performed to an audience of over 200 people! Parents were treated to displays of dragon dancing, line dancing, street dance, Samba, the Charleston and the Jive. The staff and children from both schools loved every minute!



At Winhills KS2 children staged 'The X-Factory' (see p14). Other performances and productions this term have included play-in-a-day Macbeth at Thomas Eaton (see p13), Romeo & Juliet at Kimbolton and 'Hoodwinked' – the tale of Robin Hood – at Great Staughton (above, see also p6), 'Pirates of the Curry Bean' at Middlefield and Mary Poppins at The Round House (see p12).

Over 750 teachers and support staff have attended our training courses this year. Our highly successful Maths and English Subject Leader Development days at Wyboston Lakes Training Centre have attracted 150 Subject Leaders from Bedfordshire, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire. We introduced new courses this year, including an Early Career Development Programme, funded by the DfE, and training sessions for new members of Trust LGBs. Thank you to all the facilitators who develop and run these courses, and make them so successful.

Professional Development Meetings (PDMs) for teachers and teaching assistants have continued this year, enabling all staff to share good practice and to work with colleagues across the Trust.

Our Specialist Leaders in Education (SLEs) have continued to carry out effective School to School Support work. This support is wide ranging and includes both visits to the schools being supported but also visits by them to Diamond Learning Trust schools to see and discuss good practice. We will continue to provide bespoke support to schools next year with the aim of impacting teaching and learning, helping to drive school improvement.



'None of the suggestions promoted by the DTSA have been onerous with staff well-being in mind. In fact, they have been just good practice. Ideas are designed to make our teaching more effective and enjoyable, but not make our job more difficult! Our 2018-19 cohort of School Direct trainee teachers have successfully completed their final placements and we are pleased that all of them have secured teaching jobs with the DLPT for September. Two of our schools welcomed three final placement PGCE trainees from the Faculty of Education at Cambridge University. They completed their placements successfully and we hope to offer placements to more trainees next academic year. We would also like to congratulate our NQTs on the successful completion of their induction year; we look forward to supporting them in their careers over the coming years. The Diamond Teaching School would like to thank all mentors for supporting and coaching our trainees so well.

We look forward to welcoming new trainee teachers in the Autumn term as they embark on their year-long course to qualify.

### **Braybrook**





The Braybrook Dancers had a fabulous time at the Cresset dance show. They time travelled back to the 80's where they danced to 'Give it Up' by KC and the Sunshine Band. Their costumes, glitter and curly 'hair-do's really helped them to play the part! All the dancers made themselves, Miss Bloomfield, their families, friends and the rest of the Braybrook Family proud with how well they performed and how hard they worked over the last few months to pull it off. Great work girls – well done and thank you!

Year 5 had an amazing day at the Warner Brother Studios, immersing themselves in the 'Wizarding World of Harry Potter'. The children enjoyed learning all about how the famous movies were made, and exploring the sets, props, costumes and animations used when filming. Children were blown away by the animations used to film the Gringotts bank scenes. They enjoyed trying 'Butter Beer', taking part in wand demonstrations and riding the flying broomstick — just like real students of Hogwarts School!





Children from Year 1 to 3 visited Serpentine Green as part of an incentive run by the Literacy Trust. The children participated in a puppet workshop, an interactive storytelling session and had the opportunity to have a go at spinning a pizza dough base. Even the adults had a go!

Year 4 tasted a little of 'The Magic of the Musicals'. After practising songs from 'Oliver' at school, they then spent the day at the Cresset Theatre, rehearsing and singing with pupils from schools across Peterborough. The children experienced working with a team of professional directors and singing specialists, led by William Prideaux. The day culminated in an evening performance for parents and members of the general public, accompanied by an orchestra. This was an exciting opportunity organised by 'Peterborough Sings' and funded by Arts Council England, as part of the current Peterborough Singing Strategy.

that they have sewn and printed.










# Roman Way

### The Round House



All of our children have worked with the coaches from **Cambridge Rugby Club** over a number of sessions to develop their teamwork skills.

All our pupils have participated in **educational visits** this term; Our Preschool and Reception children visited **Hamerton Zoo**, Years 1 / 2 children learned about the Anglo Saxons at **West Stow**, Year 3 visited **The** 



Tower of London, Years 4/5 visited The Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge to find out more about the Ancient Eqyptians, and our Year 6 are visiting Gulliver's World as a well-earned reward for all their hard work leading up to their SATs.

Our Year 6 pupils spent a day working with Louise to create their own "play in a day". They spent the day exploring the text of Macbeth and in the afternoon, they performed their own most wonderful rendition of this classic story. The audience were spell bound and thoroughly enjoyed the show!



### **Winhills**

The KS2 end of year performance was 'The X-Factory', which follows a school, 'St Dithers', on the brink of closure after being deemed 'average' by Ofset. A range of talented teachers and pupils, including Simon Trowell and his X-Factor judges are brought in. Eventually, the old pupils and teachers decide to fight back as Simon's evil plot comes to light – the result was a very funny and entertaining show, with some wonderful songs and dances led by Years 3, 4 and 5. Well done to all the Year 6 children for learning their lines and performing so well on the night - they were a credit to the school.





At **Woburn Safari Park**, Year 1 and 2 were able to see a wide range of animals that they have been learning about this term. During the road safari they saw elephants, giraffes, lions, tigers, bears and much more. As part of the foot safari, they had a talk from one of the rangers about the meerkats, where they shared their own knowledge, and learned lots of amazing facts about these little animals.

Year 3 were extremely lucky to visit **Buckingham Palace!** They had their own tour around the Royal Mews and the Queens Gallery. During the tour of the Queen's Gallery, they learned all about Leonardo Da Vinci and took part in a creative writing workshop which they have used to help them with their poems in English.



Year 5 had a fantastic visit to the **National Space Centre in Leicester**. They learned about astronauts and their space suits, finding out about how they live in space by stepping inside a replica of part of the International Space Station. They also climbed the iconic rocket tower to discover all about the Russian-American space race and Apollo 11 which landed on the moon fifty years ago this month.

Reception visited **Paxton Pits** earlier this term. They had an amazing time where they got to try lots of different outdoor activities such as Pond Dipping. The children all came back to

school so excited to tell everyone about their trip. Paxton Pits staff commented on how well behaved all the

children were.

This term children at Winhills have continued to benefit from visits to and from BOSCH Rexroth. The reasoning behind this is to help embed a love of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) at a younger age. BOSCH Rexroth worked across the school in Years 1-4, with Year 5 and 6 visiting their site. They have been focussing on how hydraulics can be used to move an object. 
